Highlights of the Justice and Public Safety (JPS) Budget

The Conference Budget for JPS in FY 2022-23, includes net appropriations of \$3.47 billion, which is \$124.3 million above the FY 2021-22 amount, a 3.59% increase. The highlights of the JPS adjustments are as follows:

Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC)

Committee Report Items (Pages E1-E7)

- Provides funding for **38 judicial support staff**, including Court Coordinators, in District and Superior Court. (\$3.9 million R and \$48k NR).
- Provides funding for 93 Deputy and Assistant Clerks. (\$5.3 million R and \$97k NR).
- Provides funding for **13 Magistrates** in Caswell, Cleveland, Lincoln, Mecklenburg, and Wake counties. (\$924k R and \$39k NR).
- Provides funding for **11** Assistant District Attorneys to address workload needs. (\$1.5 million R and \$41k NR).

Special Provisions

• (Sec. 16.7) Increases the amount of witness compensation for former law enforcement officers testifying in court.

Indigent Defense Services (IDS)

Committee Report Items (Pages E8-E12)

• Provides funding for two Assistant Public Defenders and one Administrative Assistant III in District 29A, Rutherford and McDowell counties. (\$371k R).

Special Provisions

• (Sec. 17.1) Authorizes the use of Private Assigned Counsel (PAC) funds to establish a new Public Defender Office in District 2, Beaufort, Hyde, Martin, Tyrell, and Washington counties, and expand Public Defender Office in District 5 to include Pender County.

Department of Justice (DOJ)

Committee Report Items (Pages E13-E18)

• Provides funding for **4 State Crime Lab positions**. (\$428k R).



Department of Public Safety (DPS)

Committee Report Items (Pages E19-E28)

- Provides funding to the State Highway Patrol to **replace outdated and out-of-warranty tasers** and related equipment. (\$4.5 million NR).
- Provides funding to the State Bureau of Investigation for **equipment and information technology needs**. (\$282k R and \$2 million NR).
- Provides funding for 19 **specialized mental health and reentry Probation and Parole Officers (PPO)** to support the needs of offenders on community supervision with persistent mental health and substance abuse issues and facilitate access to services and programs that support successful reentry. (\$1.9 million R).
- Provides funding for 122 positions and facility operating costs, at the 60 bed **Rockingham Youth Development Center** and the 24 bed **Perquimans Detention Center**. Both facilities are scheduled to open in 2023. (\$4.6 million R and \$1.1 million NR).

Special Provisions

- (Sec. 19A.4) Directs DPS to work with the Office of State Budget and Management to convert vacant Correction Officer positions into administrative positions for the newly created Department of Corrections.
- (Sec. 19C.2) Requires PPOs to reduce the supervision period of offenders under post release supervision for meeting certain conditions of their reintegration period. Credit awarded cannot reduce the length of the offender's supervision period by more than 20%.
