

# Dedication Set Today

North Carolina's new Legislative Building, completed nearly two years ago, will be formally dedicated in ceremonies here today at 11 a.m.

Chief Justice Emery B. Denny of the State Supreme Court will pronounce the official dedication of the \$6.2 million glass-and-marble structure on Halifax Street. State Sen. Clarence Stone, president of the Senate, will accept the building for the Legislature.

Dignitaries from across the State will be on hand for the ceremonies. Members of General Assembly sessions held since building plans began in 1959 have been invited as special guests. State, city and county government officials round out the invitation list.

Gov. Sanford, who has been away all week, will return to Raleigh today to make a brief speech at the dedication. Other speakers will include Governor-Elect Dan K. Moore, House Speaker Clifton Blue, Sen. Thomas J. White and Edward Durrell Stone, New York archi-

tect who worked with the local firm of Holloway and Reeves on the design for the building.

In addition, clergymen representing the Protestant, Roman Catholic and Jewish faiths will offer prayers. Music will be furnished by the University of North Carolina Band, the N. C. State Drum - and - Bugle Corps, and members of glee clubs at UNC-Greensboro and Duke University.

The Legislative Building — generally called the "State House" — was planned during the administration of former Gov. Luther Hooges, now U.S. Secretary of Commerce, and was first used by the 1963 Legislature.
